


GeorgiaTrend 2021 Georgia Education Guide

An Essential Resource for Comparing Post-secondary Educational Options in Georgia



Deciding where to go to college is one of the first major decisions of adulthood. It's a time for questions, considering options and doing research. This year, amid the usual questions of where to go for a particular program or certificate, and how much everything costs, you probably have questions about online degrees or how the institution your student is interested in addresses disruptions caused by the coronavirus.

Our guide will help answer some of those questions (though for the timeliest information on COVID-19 questions, the best source will always be the specific institution's website). The Georgia Education Guide is a resource to navigate the state's outstanding post-secondary educational options.

COLLEGE CHOICES/OUTSTANDING OPTIONS

For students looking to live away from home, there are plenty of options at institutions large and small, public and private, from the mountains to the coast.

If your student is taking a non-traditional path, entering the world of work while pursuing their education or staying close to home during these uncertain times, the outstanding Technical College System of Georgia (TCSG) offers 22 excellent educational options across the state.

In 2020, three Georgia schools ranked among the nation's 50 best universities in the U.S. News & World Report rankings of the nation's best schools – **Emory University** placed 21st, **Georgia Tech** tied for 35th and the **University of Georgia** tied for 47th.

Georgia is home to nine accredited historically black colleges and universities (HBCU) including the nation's top ranked HBCU, **Spelman College**, a private all women's college. Four other Georgia HBCUs were among the top

50: **Morehouse College** (sixth), **Clark Atlanta University** (15th), **Fort Valley State University** (tied for 38th) and **Savannah State University** (tied for 50th).

Several Georgia universities ranked among the nation's best for military veterans in various categories including **Brenau University** (Gainesville), **Georgia College & State University** (Milledgeville), **Georgia Tech** (Atlanta), **Mercer University** (Macon), **Shorter University** (Rome), **Toccoa Falls** (Toccoa), the **University of Georgia** (Athens), and **University of North Georgia** (Dahlonega).



STATE COLLEGES & UNIVERSITIES

There are 26 institutions in the University System of Georgia (USG). They are broken into four categories – research universities, comprehensive universities, state universities, and state colleges – each with a different mission, which are listed below from their websites. PRIVATE COLLEGES & UNIVERSITIES

According to the Georgia Independent College Association (GICA) 2019 Annual Report, more than 72,000 students were enrolled in private colleges and universities in Georgia. The organization, representing powerhouses from Emory University, Spelman College and Morehouse College, to smaller institutions like Agnes Scott College and Reinhardt University, says private institutions educate a diverse student body.

In 2019, the most recent data available, showed a cross-section of students, came from across Georgia. More than 58% were non-white, 11% were over age 25, and 42% received the federal Pell grant for economically disadvantaged students. More than 62% of undergraduates that attended GICA institutions and received financial aid came from families with incomes less than \$60,000. Additionally, GICA institutions participate in an articulation agreement with the Technical College System of Georgia helping students wishing to transfer into GICA member institutions so they don't waste time or money on their way to earning their degree. TECHNICAL COLLEGES

The Technical College System of Georgia is a critical piece of the education picture, and plays an important role in driving economic and workforce development throughout the state. It's made up of a network of 22 public technical colleges and adult education courses and offers everything from certificates to advanced degrees for students both on-site and online. Technical colleges offer Dual Enrollment classes providing the opportunity for high school students to get a leg up on their college courses. FOCUS ON: NEXUS DEGREES

In December 2020, the first two Georgia students received their nexus degrees – both in film production, one of the state's fastest growing industries. Nexus degrees were added by the University System of Georgia in 2018 to steer more Georgians toward careers in high-demand sectors, fields like aerospace, blockchain cybersecurity, film production, fintech (financial technology), health informatics, information technology (IT), logistics or supply chain management, and mechatronics. Georgia is the only state offering nexus degrees which combine classroom instruction and experiential learning, often including an internship with an employee partner. FOCUS ON: COLLEGE AND COVID-19

Every student and family has to assess the risk and decide for themselves whether or not they are comfortable attending college during this unprecedented time of pandemic. There is simply no way to predict in March what things will be like in August, but according to the Centers for Disease

Control, here are general principles we do know:

- The lowest risk of exposure is virtual-only learning options, activities, and events.
- There is some risk of exposure when students, faculty, and staff engage in the hybrid learning model (virtual learning with some in-person learning, limited to courses and lab instruction that can't be delivered remotely), this while following all known protocols (proper use of face masks, social distancing and hand hygiene).
- The higher risk of exposure occurs when students, faculty, and staff engage in in-person only learning, activities, and events while following the known protocols of wearing face masks, social distancing and hand hygiene.
- The highest risk of exposure exists when students, faculty, and staff engage in in-person only learning, activities, and events without maintaining any of the proper protocols.

Most institutions have COVID-19 policies and resources in place. In some cases, institutions have developed apps to communicate directly with students, and each institution lists its own policies on its website. FOCUS ON: WHERE SHOULD I GO TO COLLEGE?

By this point you may have several options in front of you – attending a traditional four-year college or university, one where you live away from home in a dorm or an apartment; or taking classes at a community or technical college while living at home or in your own apartment; or taking a "gap year" while living and helping at home, working to save money for college, or a combination thereof.

There are advantages and disadvantages of each of these choices and it's important to know what's best for you. For example, at this point, most high school students know how well they respond to online instruction. How will you respond if the institution you choose to attend needs to pivot to remote learning?

Need help? Talk with your parents, a trusted teacher or guidance counselor. A virtual visit to the schools you're most interested in might help answer your questions or concerns. Get in touch with the admissions officers at your top choices and let them know your questions or concerns.

FOCUS ON: HOW TO BUDGET FOR COLLEGE

Maybe a savings account with your name on it has been growing since the day you were born, just waiting for the day you were headed off to college. If so, count yourself very fortunate indeed. But paying for college isn't impossible. The first thing to know is how much it costs.

You can find the annual Cost of Attendance (COA) for most institutions on their websites. The COA is based on a number of factors including the program of study, the location of the school, the size of the school and its reputation. The COA is a budget or an estimated cost of expenses for one year of tuition and fees, room and board, books and supplies, transportation and an estimate of personal expenses.

PAYING FOR COLLEGE

CHECK OUT THESE GRANTS

The Georgia Student Finance Commission maintains an excellent website about the all-important financial side of college. Bookmark it now – gafutures.org. This is where you'll find information on the all-important FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) which is required each year when applying for any and all student aid. The Georgia Futures website also has handy Federal Student Grants and Scholarship Search tabs. Use them! Unlike loans, scholarships and grants aren't required to be repaid. These links to "free money" can help your student receive an outstanding education at a much lower out-of-pocket cost.

The average cost of tuition and fees at a four-year public institution in Georgia is around \$14,559. This doesn't include room and board, books, transportation or other expenses. Most students require assistance to pay for their education. They include:

- Student loans:** Anyone can qualify for a student loan. Recipients need a Social Security number; if male, they are required to register with Selective Service. Interest rates vary depending on the need of the applicant. Student loans are repaid with interest.

- Grants:** There are stipulations and qualifications about who may receive grant funding. Grants do not need to be repaid.

- Scholarships:** Scholarships are awarded by many different types of organizations for a host of different reasons including merit- and needs-based scholarships. There are scholarships for students that have contributed to their communities and scholarships given in honor of individuals. Scholarships do not have to be repaid. Career and guidance counselors have information about scholarships, and there are websites with scholarships online.

- Work-Study:** Institutions often make employment opportunities available to students to offset the cost of room/board or fees. Work schedules are arranged to ensure that the job doesn't conflict with the student's studies.

HOPE Scholarship & Zell Miller Scholarship

The HOPE Scholarship was started in 1993. It's a merit-based scholarship funded by the Georgia Lottery, which also pays for the Zell Miller Scholarship and Georgia's Pre-K program. In addition to basic eligibility requirements including citizenship, residency, and Selective Service requirements (for males), students wishing to receive a HOPE scholarship must also graduate from a HOPE-eligible high school (or home study course) with a minimum 3.0 GPA as calculated by the Georgia Student Finance Commission (GFSC), and meet specific course rigor requirements.

The Zell Miller Scholarship is also a merit-based scholarship. It offers full tuition at a public college or university, or tuition assistance at an eligible private institution. In addition to fulfilling the same basic requirements, which include citizenship, residency, and Selective Service requirements (for males), students wishing to receive the Zell Miller Scholarship must graduate from an eligible high school with a minimum 3.7 HOPE GPA and an SAT score of 1200 or a minimum composite 26 on the ACT. The amount of the HOPE scholarship or grant varies and is determined by the college or university. Hope Career Grants

These unique grants are available to students enrolled in programs that align with high-demand industries in Georgia – everything from manufacturing to aviation to healthcare. With a HOPE Career Grant, it's possible to have most if not all of your college tuition completely funded by the state of Georgia. In many cases, students only need to earn a certificate to graduate, in others a diploma is awarded. These programs are only offered at certain public state universities, colleges and technical colleges. 



ACADEMICS: VSU offers nearly 200 academic programs leading to associate, bachelor, master, specialist, and doctoral degrees as well as options to add a certification, minor, endorsement, or certificate to that degree. COST/AID: Types of financial aid available at VSU include grants, scholarships, work study, loans, and veterans benefits. About 80% of our 2020-2021 students received some type of financial assistance.

Estimated cost of attendance for a full-time undergraduate student from Georgia or a border state is about \$8,000 per semester. This includes on-campus housing and meal plan.

FACULTY/RESEARCH: At VSU we believe that learning is best done actively and in collaboration with others. It's the reason we place so much emphasis on student-faculty research, giving our students the

chance to participate in cutting-edge research projects – treatment options for COVID-19, targeted drug delivery options for cancer, finding a cure for drug-resistant tuberculosis, using artificial reefs to support underwater ecosystems and cultivate bryostatin for use in treating cancer, neurological diseases, and more –as early as freshman year. 



RIBBON CUTTING FOR THE CARLTON CONSTRUCTION ACADEMY PHASE II

SCHEDULED MARCH 2021

Hurricane Michael made landfall along the Florida panhandle near Panama City on October 10, 2018, as an extremely dangerous Category 5 hurricane. The storm's eyewall swept north-northeast still as a Category 3 storm. Winds were more than 115 mph at times.

Albany, Georgia experienced the devastating storm, Hurricane Michael, and it impaired much of the city. One of the buildings on Albany Technical College's campus, Carlton Construction Academy, suffered extensive damage to the roof.

Repair of the Carlton Construction Academy facility began February 2019 and took less than one year to reopen Phase I, Fall 2019. Albany Technical College worked closely with the Technical College System of Georgia to secure the financing and oversee the project.

The COVID-19 pandemic caused plans to shift. Phase II of the Carlton Construction Academy was completed in Fall 2020, and the official ribbon cutting was planned for March 2021.

In 2003, Albany Tech acquired the Carlton Construction Academy site through a donation from the philanthropic Carlton Family. At the time

of the donation, the facility was valued at \$2 million.

Phase II of the facility renovation centered on an extensive overhaul of the site's industrial warehouse space. These renovations provided additional classroom space and lab upgrades for programs like Electrical Construction and Civil Engineering Technology. There is now space to add several new disciplines to the curriculum, including Green Building Technology; Residential Energy Efficiency; and Renewable, Sustainable Energy.

The project added 28,633 square feet of useable space to the Academy and also called for HVAC and architectural upgrades needed to house a modern teaching facility. During the renovation, the facility's facade was modified to reflect the architectural design of other campus buildings that face Slappey Boulevard, one of Albany's major thoroughfares.
